Woodland Stewardship Course This Fall

Managing Longleaf Pine Straw

Longleaf pine trees deposit an annual blanket of needles, often called pine straw, on the forest floor. Many forest owners do not realize that it is possible to sell this straw. But in fact, wise management of this resource can substantially increase an owner's income from forestland. Retail sales of North Carolina longleaf pine straw in 2016 were estimated to exceed \$34.8 million annually. This volume could easily be doubled or tripled if owners were more aware of this opportunity. You can find the full article here.
