
History of the North Carolina Christmas Tree Industry: Chapter 1

Economic Contributions of Forestry and Forest Exports in North Carolina

North Carolina is one of the leading states in forest products exports. In this report, authors quantified the value of the North Carolina forest export chain including the manufacturing facilities that exports, wholesales/brokers, transporters, and port service providers. The total economic output of the forest products export cluster in North Carolina was \$3.49 billion in 2015 dollars, supporting 15,636 full- and part-time jobs. Pine Pulpwood: Driving the Southern Timber Price Rebound

This article from Forest2Market explored the pine pulpwood markets in the south and how they fared in recent years. While south-wide average pine sawtimber prices are down 35%, pine pulpwood prices are up 47% since 2002. Specifically, pine pulpwood prices near the Atlantic Coast (in SE coastal plains) soared up to 150%, due primarily to the flourishing pellet industry. The pine pulpwood market is driving the timber market, as we see the market grow stronger and the gap between pine pulpwood, chip-n-saw and sawtimber has narrowed.
