SYP Lumber Prices Deflate in 2019; What's in Store for 2020?

Southern Yellow Pine lumber prices continue trending down with an annual average of \$361 per thousand board feet in 2019. While the US housing market is relatively stable below the historical annual average of 1.5 million housing starts, lumber prices in 2019 finished at their lowest point since 2015.
