### **Pine Sawtimber Prices Increased**

U.S. housing starts have trended downward in the last few months. In the first quarter of 2019, South-wide average stumpage prices were up for all major timber products, except for hardwood sawtimber, mainly because of season-long wet weather in the southeast region. All pine product prices were up at least 5% from the fourth quarter of 2018. For more
